Interviews can be done through video conferencing or by phone if necessary.



Adults are also needed to make our camp happen! Camp adult applications are also available on our website. Adults do not need to interview, but all adults at camp must be 4H enrolled leaders. If you are considering participating in camp, please begin the process of becoming a registered leader today. Adults need to attend a volunteer in preparation training, complete the online mandated reporter training and pass a national background check. If you have any questions about this process, please call the UW-Extension Office.

Scan over the monthly 4-H newsletter (Family Times). Read articles that interest you, because not all activities are announced at your club meeting. Take advantage of the opportunities!

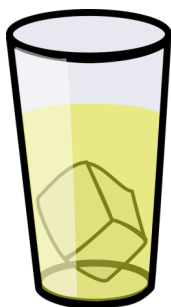
Ask your club leader to match your family up with a mentor family who you can contact for questions and support.

To be eligible for Wisconsin 4-H Foundation scholarships, students must have been a Wisconsin 4-H member for at least one year; have a grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale, and be enrolled or planning to enroll at a university, college or technical school during the 2019-2020 academic school year.

Tractor Safety & Certification-March 2019



Does your son or daughter work on a farm during the summer? Do you hire youth to work for you during the year? Do these young people have adequate safety training?

To help reduce accidents, a Farm Tractor Safety Certification Course is being coordinated by UW-Extension Washington, Ozaukee, Sheboygan, & Fond du Lac Counties. The 24 hour course will be held on the following **Saturdays – March 9, 16, 23, and 30** from **9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.** March 9 and 16 will be held at Campbellsport High School and March 23 and 30 will be held at Allenton Town Hall. The course

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focuses on the safety aspects of operating farm equipment. To complete the course, youth must attend all four sessions and pass a written and driving exam.

The course includes classroom safety instruction for tractors and farm machinery operation, hazard recognition and correction, general farm safety knowledge, and how to approach farm safety with a positive attitude. In addition, the course is designed for youth ages 14-15 who need the federal certificate of training for employment on farms, youth ages 12-16 who will be operating tractors or self-propelled farm machinery on public roads for their own family, and youths interested in tractor and machinery safety. Youth must be the **minimum age of 12** in order to register.

Youth who drive a tractor for their parents may still do so without the formal training program as long as they do not operate the tractor on a public road.

If you intend to hire youth on your farm, make sure that they enroll in this course for your protection as well as theirs.

The cost of the course is **\$35.00 per student** and is **limited to the first 25 paid participants**.

Taking Care of Business

4-H Specialty License Plates

The 4-H specialty license plate is now available through the Wisconsin Department of Motor Vehicles. Bearing the 4-H Clover and the message “Empowering Our Youth”, the plate offers the opportunity to show support of the 4-H program, as well as make a financial contribution. The sale of each license plate will include a monetary contribution to the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation.

Half of the proceeds from every plate sale will go back to the county where the licensed vehicle is housed, and the other half will be used for state and regional 4-H programs. Counties with license plate sales will receive a disbursement from the Foundation on a yearly basis, with a check payable to the county's Leader's Association. The funds may be used to support the county 4-H program under the direction of the County Educator.



Vehicles that qualify for the 4-H license plate include:

- Automobiles
- Motor homes (annual registration only)
- Motor trucks
 - 4,500, 6,000 or 8,000 pounds gross weight including dual purpose farm and dual purpose motor home
 - 12,000 pounds gross weight farm truck

Persons requesting Wisconsin 4-H license plates will pay:

- The regular registration fee for the vehicle if the current plates expire within three months or the vehicles has no plates.
- \$15 issuance fee or an annual \$15 personalized plate fee, if requested.
- \$25 annual donation. The donation may be deductible.

4-H license plates may be personalized by paying a \$15 personalized plate fee each year in addition to the \$25 donation and regular annual registration fee. With each annual license plate renewal, 4-H supporters will pay the regular registration fee for non-personalized 4-H license plates and the \$25 donation.

4-H Policies

The current Fond du Lac County 4-H policies on membership and achievement are listed below. They are also found in the enrollment booklet and on our website.

FOND DU LAC COUNTY 4-H POLICY ON MEMBERSHIP

1. Youth wishing to join Fond du Lac County 4-H must be enrolled in kindergarten (and be at least five years old by October 1, 2018) through one year after high school graduation and not to extend beyond the age of 19 as of December 31 of the enrollment year. Youth in grades K-2 enroll in the Cloverbud project.
2. Re-enrollment period is until October 31. New member enrollments will be accepted until Jan. 31, 2019. Members not enrolled by the appropriate date will not be eligible to exhibit for a premium at the 2019 Fond du Lac County Fair. However, they will be able to participate in other club and county events. Memberships must be accepted all year long.
3. Dropping a project must be done in writing by the first Friday in April. Projects may not be added after the enrollment deadline.
4. Policy on re-enrollment of non-achievement members is left to the local club.
5. It is recommended that younger members take one project only, and a maximum of five projects be taken by older members.
6. A member should satisfactorily complete all projects carried in order to be an achievement member. (See Fond du Lac County 4-H Achievement Policy)
7. Members qualify for full graduation honors upon completion of high school, though they have the option to remain in 4-H one year past high school graduation.
8. A member is to enroll in one 4-H club during the enrollment year.



FOND DU LAC COUNTY 4-H ACHIEVEMENT POLICY

Fond du Lac County 4-H strives to provide a positive experience to the youth members who join. "Achievement" within the program plays a fundamental role in order for young people to obtain the most beneficial 4-H experience.



Youth members must enroll in at least one 4-H project.

Youth members are expected to complete all 4-H projects enrolled in for the year. Youth members should be aware of the county deadline for dropping projects.

Re-enrolling members must achieve in all projects the previous 4-H year. Members who do not achieve in the previous year may have their membership role limited the next year i.e. not be able to hold a club office or be allowed to take any more than 2 projects.

Youth members must publicly exhibit (such as Alto Fair, county fair, etc.) at least one exhibit in every project enrolled in. Legitimate reasons for not exhibiting at a fair event should be corresponded with your club's General Leader so that alternate accommodations may occur - examples include club or project meetings.

Youth members must complete and submit to their 4-H club a Record Book. This Record Book should be completed to the best of the member's ability, with proper forms completed for each project enrolled in.

Cloverbuds (members in grades K - 2) should complete a Cloverbud scrapbook. Turn it in to the club general leader who will provide feedback. Cloverbuds are not eligible for any county awards.

Youth members must fulfill attendance requirements as established at the club level. Every effort should be made to be an active member of the club in order to be considered for county and state level events. If active membership is a hardship you are encouraged to communicate with club leaders.

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Upon the first year of achievement the member (including Cloverbuds) will receive a nameplate and disc. In following years, a disc is earned for each year of achievement.

Leader Association Minutes & Agendas

Leader Association meeting minutes are available on the 4-H website on the County Association/4-H Leaders Association page. You will find minutes from the full leader meetings, and from the executive board meetings, in addition to upcoming meeting dates.



What is the Discretionary Fund?

The budget of the Fond du Lac County 4-H Leaders Association includes a discretionary fund. The purpose is to aid members who may have limited financial resources to participate in 4-H programs. If you need to access funds, please contact Amy Mangan-Fischer at the UW-Extension office.

4-H Emblem Guidelines

The 4-H Name and Emblem is a highly valued mark within our country's history. Therefore, the 4-H Clover has been granted federal protection noted by the 18USC707 on the lower right of the clover. Because of this status, **there are specific guidelines for using the 4-H name and emblem.** If you are a chartered 4-H entity, you have the right to use the clover emblem. There is no fee or paperwork to be completed. If your club or committee will be using the clover on printed items, contact the Extension Office for guidelines or refer to this document <https://nifa.usda.gov/sites/default/files/resource/4-H%20Name%20and%20Emblem%20User%20Guide%202014.pdf> (pages 10-13).

4-H Members Have Accident Policy Coverage

Each member is covered by accident insurance when participating in an approved and adult supervised group activity. It does not cover injuries sustained while skiing, tobogganing, sledding or tubing. Clubs are billed for this insurance annually. The American Income Life 4-H annual group accident policy covers individual 4-H clubs and country wide programs.

Plan Highlights:

- Includes incurred medical and surgical treatment, X-rays, hospital confinement, and ambulance expense up to the maximum amount
 - Covers dental services incurred within 52 weeks of the accident
 - Provides a benefit if death occurs as a result of an accident within 100 days of the accident
 - Covers loss of limbs up to a set amount
- Optional volunteer leader coverage available. Clubs pay for this coverage if requested.

If a member is injured, a claim form needs to be completed. The form is available at <https://www.aillife.com/SpecialRiskDivision/Claims>. The form may also be accessed on the 4-H website by looking under *Resources*, then under *Club Leadership*. Additionally, the adult in charge of the event should contact Ann Kaiser at the Extension Office to get the form processed once it is filled in. Injuries should be reported promptly.



Insurance for 4-H Leaders

Fond du Lac County 4-H leaders are covered by a liability insurance policy. They are automatically covered under this policy if they are a registered 4-H leader, completed the youth protection process and are acting within the scope of their volunteer role. This policy is a secondary for personal liability coverage.

Why Youth Mental Health First Aid?

Youth Mental Health First Aid teaches you **how to identify, understand and respond to signs of mental illnesses and substance use disorders**. This 8-hour training gives adults who work with youth the skills they need to reach out and provide initial support to adolescents (ages 12-18) who may be developing a mental health or substance use problem and help connect them to the appropriate care.

WHO SHOULD TAKE IT

- Teachers
- School staff
- Coaches
- Camp counselors
- Youth group leaders
- Parents
- People who work with youth

WHAT IT COVERS

- Common signs and symptoms of mental illnesses in this age group, including:
 - Anxiety
 - Depression
 - Eating disorders
 - Attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD)
- Common signs and symptoms of substance use.
- How to interact with an adolescent in crisis.
- How to connect the adolescent with help.

The course will teach you how to apply the ALGEE action plan:

- **Assess** for risk of suicide or harm
- **Listen** nonjudgmentally
- **Give** reassurance and information
- **Encourage** appropriate professional help
- **Encourage** self-help and other support strategies

Youth Mental Health First Aid training will be provided for Extension Staff and volunteers. This is a training recommended for colleagues who work and interact with youth 12-18 either professionally or personally. Participation will be limited to 30 colleagues.
